Investments mean bright future for local economy

Investments around town are giving Salem a major boost to its economy.

Seven major projects are currently underway, creating jobs and changing the landscape of the business community. These investments span across different industries, from housing to the car industry, new retail and office to manufacturing and high tech. Projects are happening throughout the community, with businesses including, Garmin AT, Norpac/Henningsen Cold Storage, PacTrust, Pringle Creek Square, McGilchrist and Roth buildings downtown, Lithia Auto, and Hanard Machine.

Several projects are new developments, while others are expansions to current facilities.


Lithia Auto Group is currently developing 20 acres of land near Salem Parkway and Cherry Avenue in north Salem to relocate their three dealerships. The project, expected to be completed by the end of this year, means a capital investment in Salem of \$15-\$20 million, and 15-20 full-time jobs added by the stores. They are focused on using local contractors, including CD Redding and Cherry City Electric, and will also focus on hiring local people.

According to Jon Taylor at Lithia, this is more than just an investment in their business, but also an investment in the community.

"We want to see the city of Salem succeed, bring jobs to Salem and keep money in the Salem economy," he says.

Meanwhile, Henningsen is building a cold storage facility for Norpac Foods, Inc., which will become their main distribution center, with their corporate office relocating from Stayton to Salem. Combined, the two companies will invest over \$30 million into the economy, with 40 jobs added to Henningsen.

One of the most anticipated projects is Pringle Creek Square - the redevelopment of the Boise property. Demolition is now underway on the South Block which will be the first of several development projects that will transform the 13-acre site into a mix of residential, office, retail, medical and recreational uses. The South Block project alone will generate \$42.8 million in new economic activity and support 252 construction jobs. Once complete, the ongoing economic impact is forecasted to be \$11.6 million annually, supporting 113 jobs. The first phase, set to be complete in June 2015, will include 15,000 square feet of office and retail space and 115 apartments.

All these are signs that Salem's economy is on the rebound.

"Projects like this have a multiplier effect," says Jason Brandt, CEO of the Salem Area Chamber of Commerce. "Businesses see this kind of activity going on and become increasingly confident in our economy, which encourages more investments of this kind. Likewise, it builds consumer confidence which means people are more likely to spend money here."

Event helps students prepare for future

Each year, hundreds of area high school students fill the Salem Convention Center for Career Connections. The mock-interview event that gives students the opportunity to learn what it's like to have an interview, giving students like Maddie Brown, an opportunity they might not otherwise have.

"I was so nervous I was shaking," she said before her first interview. After completing her first interview though, the South Salem High School student began to relax and enjoy herself.

"I feel so relieved that I know what an interview is going to be like, and I'm just excited to go to another one."

Nearly 300 volunteers from the business community dedicate their time and expertise to helping students with their interview skills and resumes.

Students like Brown, who now know what to expect when they interview for real.

"This is such a great opportunity for us as teenagers to learn how to interview."

Students meet with volunteers from the business community to practice their interviewing skills at Career Connections.

"If anybody else out there has thought about doing this, this is a great opportunity and I strongly encourage you to participate when the opportunity arises," says Dickey. "It's a great way to be a positive influence to these kids in our community and our future."
